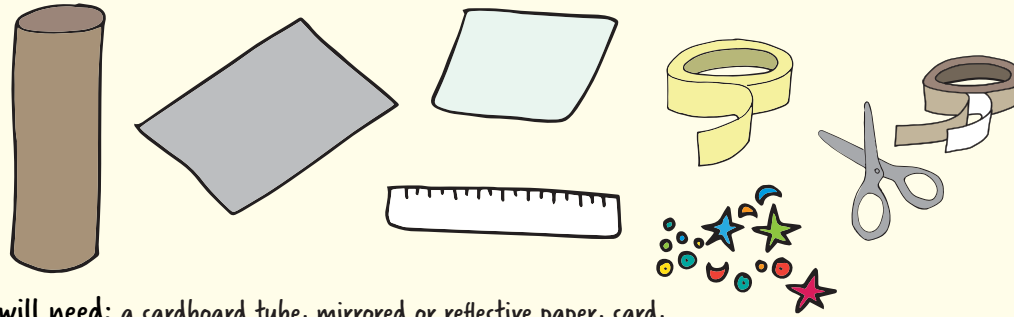
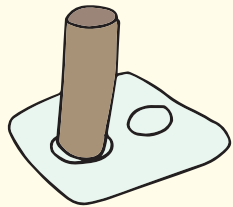




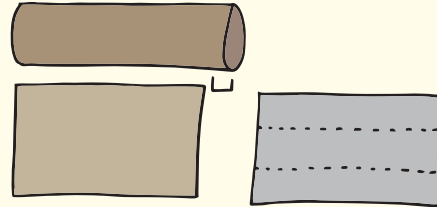
# MAkE a kaleidoscope



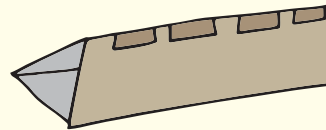
You will need: a cardboard tube, mirrored or reflective paper, card, recycled pastic, beads or sequins, coloured papers or pens for decorating, ruler, scissors, double-sided sticky tape and tape.



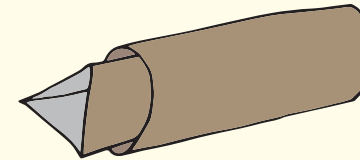
1. Cut out 2 circles from the recycled plastic. One circle needs to fit inside your tube and the other will fit outside so can be a little larger than the tube.



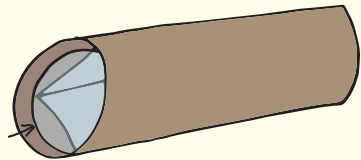
2. Take a piece of card shorter than the length of your tube and divide it into three. Cover it in your mirror paper.



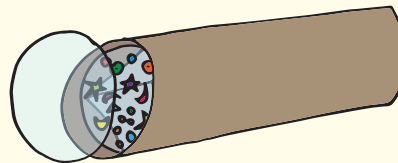
3. Fold the card and stick the edges together to make a triangular prism. Make sure the mirror paper is on the inside.



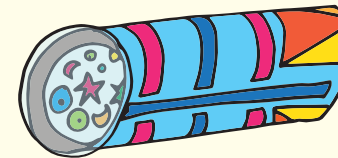
4. Push the triangle into the cardboard tube



5. Take the smaller plastic circle and push it into the tube so it rests on the triangle and secure it with sticky tape.



6. Put some sequins and coloured beads into the tube and seal with the second plastic circle.



7. Finally decorate the outside of the tube.

Now it's ready for you to look through it, what can you see?

## Britten's Camera



In 1965, Britten and Pears travelled to Armenia as tourists. During their stay in the Composers' Union Resort in Dilijan, Britten received this Soviet-made camera

from Mstislav Rostropovich (1927-2007) the Soviet cellist and conductor. Britten and Rostropovich were close friends. And he composed several works for the cellist, including Cello Symphony (1963) and Cello Sonata (1961).

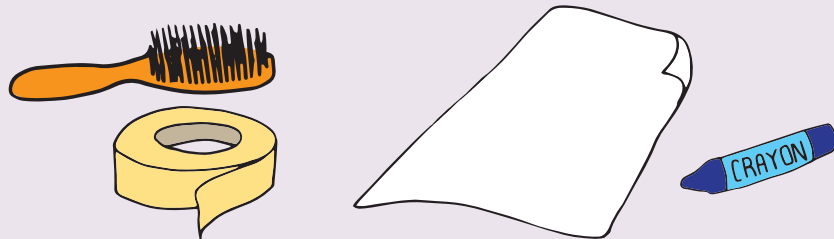

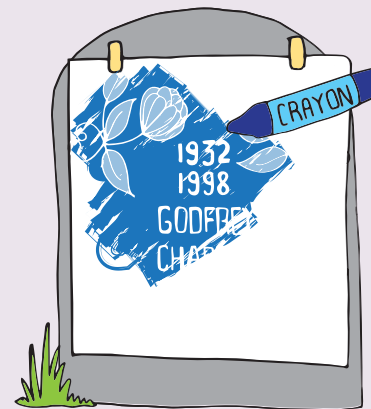
# MAkE a churchyard rubbing

Please note: always ask permission from the Vicar or Church Warden before you attempt to take any rubbings.

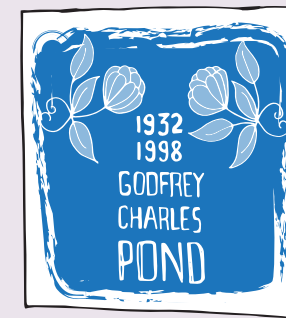


You will need- a soft brush, scissors, masking tape, a large piece of white paper, a wax crayon

1. Select a gravestone which has interesting text or pattern on it. Gently brush any surface dirt off the area which you would like to copy.



2. Stick your piece of paper onto the gravestone with masking tape. With the wax crayon, rub over the paper. The text or writing will appear.



3. When you have completed your rubbing, gently peel off the masking tape, and detach your rubbing.

## Aldeburgh Churchyard

There are many things to see in Aldeburgh churchyard. Many of the famous Garrett family are buried here. It is also the final resting place of Benjamin Britten and Peter Pears. The lifeboat memorial, also in the churchyard, is a constant reminder of the dangers of the sea, and of the six Aldeburgh lifeboat crew members lost in 1899.
