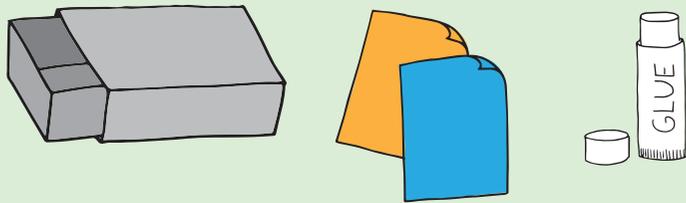
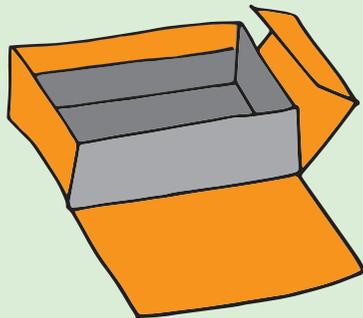
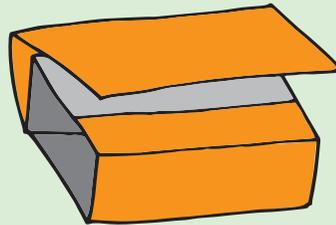


# MAkE a mini suitcase

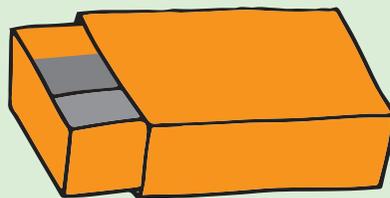


You will need- a matchbox, glue stick, coloured paper.

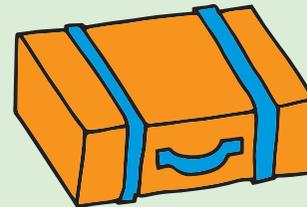
1. Remove the inside of your match box and cover the outside with coloured paper. Stick down the paper with glue and trim or fold in the edges.



2. Now cover the base and sides of the inside section your matchbox with coloured paper.



3. Push the inside of the match box back into the outside piece. Use thin strips of coloured paper to decorate your suitcase with two straps and a handle.



4. Decide where about in the world you would like to travel!



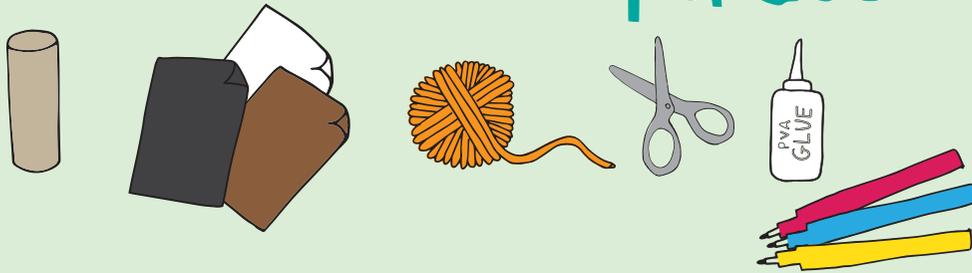
## Britten's suitcase

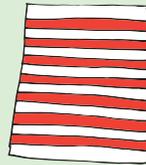

# MAkE a cardboard tube pirate



You will need: A cardboard tube - White, brown and black paper - Wool - Scissors - Glue - Coloured pens

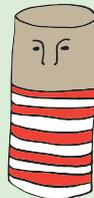
1. Draw several stripes on a sheet of paper and colour in.



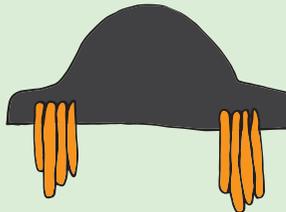
2. Stick the stripy paper around the bottom half of the tube.



3. Draw a face for your pirate on the upper part of the tube.



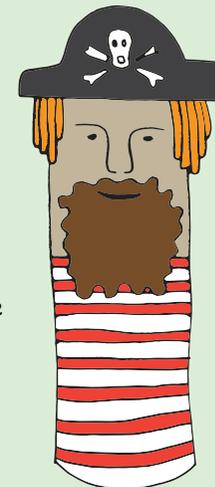
4. Make a beard from the coloured paper and stick to the face.



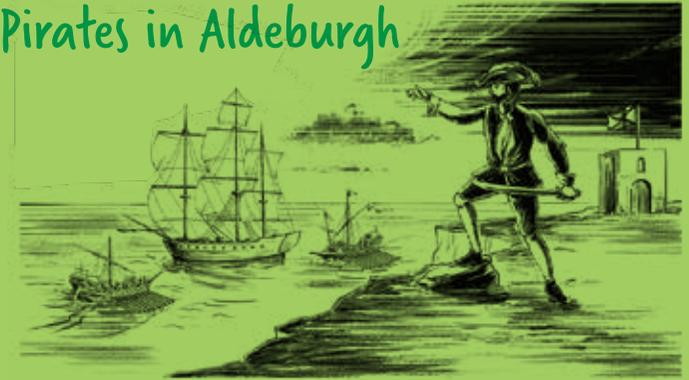
5. Cut out a pirate's hat.

6. Stick strips of wool under the hat for hair.

7. Stick the hat with hair onto the top of the tube.



## Pirates in Aldeburgh



In the 17th and 18th centuries, pirates frequently attacked Aldeburgh and its residents. They were called Dunkirkers and they stole many fishing boats from the beach and terrorised the town. As a result, Aldeburgh fisherman had no boats to fish and great poverty hit the town.
